Teaching Experience

Undergraduate Courses: American History Survey (both halves, classes of 40 and 250, with teaching assistants), American Civilization; American Military History (one-semester survey); Military History (two-semester series), Naval History (two-semester series), Legacy of the Western World, Colonial America, Revolutionary America, The United States and the Conflicts in Southeast Asia from 1945 to 1975, U.S. Constitutional History, The World Wars of the 20th Century, The Age of Sail, and Senior Thesis. Courses incorporate lecture (with PowerPoint), discussion, and Blackboard. Some incorporate podcasts recorded outside of the classroom for posting to BlackBoard and viewing by students as homework – to permit use of class time for discussion of topics covered in podcast.

Undergraduate Experiential Learning Course: "The Price of Freedom: Normandy 1944" is a four-credit, writing intensive undergraduate and graduate seminar in which, in addition to all normal classroom activities, students participate in an eight-day "staff ride" tour of the Normandy Campaign over spring break. Students write four papers (a book review, a briefing paper, a critical analysis essay, and a biography), watch 26 lectures, watch

and discuss 14 films, and participate in 14 discussion sessions. In the most important assignment, students research a soldier from their hometown and write a biography based on information from the community and archival sources as well as interviews. They then present a eulogy for their soldier while standing at his (or her) graveside in the American Cemetery at Omaha Beach. The course satisfies three General Education requirements for the Columbian College (critical analysis, global perspective, and oral communication) and is a writing-intensive course.

Graduate Seminars:

Strategy and Policy (George Washington University, History 6032) is a graduate seminar. The course is a survey of military and naval history from 1494 to the present, based on readings from Peter Paret's *Makers of Modern Strategy*, Clausewitz, Mahan, Jomini, Russell Weigley's *American Way of War*, the Oxford *History of Modern Warfare*, Geoffrey Parker's *The Military Revolution*, Jeremy Black's *War and the World*, and extracts from the treaties of Westphalia, Utrecht, Paris (1763, 1783, and 1954) and Versailles. Students analyze critical strategic decisions of recent conflicts. The course includes both discussion and lectures that incorporate PowerPoint presentations.

Readings in Naval History from Salamis to Vietnam reviews classic writings in naval history, such as Mahan' *Influence of Sea Power upon History*, 1660-1783; Corbett's *Some Principles of Naval Warfare*; Guilmartin's *Gunpowder and Galleys*; Theodore Roosevelt's *Naval War of 1812*; Garrett Mattingly's *The Armada*; Nicholas Rodger's *The Command of the Ocean: A Naval History of Britain, 1649-1815*; Evans and Peatie's *Kaigun, Strategy, Tactics, and Technology in the Imperial Japanese Navy, 1887 – 1941*; Spector's *Eagle against the Sun*, and others.

Reading seminar in "The Age of Sail – The Influence of Sea Power Upon History" discussing major readings in naval history, including: A.T. Mahan, The Influence of Sea Power Upon History, 1660-1783; Sir Julian Corbett, Some Principles of Maritime Strategy; Bernard S. Capp, Cromwell's Navy: The Fleet and the English Revolution, 1648-1660; Glyndwr Williams, The Prize of All the Oceans: The Dramatic True Story of Commodore Anson's Voyage Round the World and How He Seized the Spanish Treasure Galleon; Jonathan R. Dull, The French Navy and the Seven Years' War, France Overseas; Nicholas A. M. Rodger, The Wooden World, an Anatomy of the Georgian Navy and The Command of the Ocean: A Naval History of Britain, 1649-1815; Piers Mackesy, The War for America, 1775 - 1783. 1993; Ira D. Gruber, The Howe Brothers and the American Revolution; Evan Thomas, John Paul Jones Sailor, Hero. Father of the American Navy; Alan Schom, Trafalgar: Countdown to Battle, 1803-1805; and Ian W. Toll, Six Frigates: The Epic History of the Founding of the U.S. Navy.

Readings and Research Seminar in the Normandy Campaign analyzes the conduct and consequences of the D-Day Invasion and the ensuing Normandy Campaign, focusing on the following readings: John Keegan, *The Second*

World War; John Lucaks, The Duel: 10 May - 31 July 1940, the Eighty Day Struggle between Churchill and Hitler; Dwight D. Eisenhower, Crusade in Europe; Roger Fleetwood Hesketh, Fortitude: The D-Day Deception Campaign; Christopeher D. Yung, Gators of Neptune: Naval Amphibious Planning for the Normandy Invasion; Stephen Ambrose, Band of Brothers: E Company, 506th Regiment, 101st Airborne from Normandy to Hitler's Eagle's Nest. New York; Alex Kershaw, The Bedford Boys: One American Town's Ultimate D-Day Sacrifice; Antony Beevor, D-Day: The Battle for Normandy; Joseph Balkoski, Omaha Beach: D-Day, June 6, 1944 or Utah Beach: The Amphibious Landing and Airborne Operations on D-Day, June 6, 1944; R. J. Overy, Why the Allies Won; Alfred Stanford, Force Mulberry: The Planning and Installation of the Artificial Harbor Off U.S. Normandy Beaches in World War II; Studs Terkel, "The Good War": An Oral History of World War Two; Marie-Louise Osmont, The Normandy Diary of Marie-Louise Osmont: 1940-1944; James Jay Carafano, After D-Day: Operation Cobra & the Normandy Breakout; and Julian Jackson, France: The Dark Years, 1940-1944.

I also assisted twice in teaching the first half of the American History Survey (from before first contact to 1877, History 71).
